SYNOPSIS

The rural Canadian town of Uxbridge can be considered to be a typical countryside community except for one distinct feature, its heritage train station.

"This film basically conveys the importance that trains had in uniting Canada." says producer/director Mark Magro. "This heritage train station should be preserved, promoted and remembered."



On a hot summer day, visitors and locals observe a piece of the past roll into town. A fully restored diesel locomotive, operated by the York-Durham Heritage railway, provides the opportunity for people to enjoy a scenic trip along the beautiful landscape of Durham. At the

Uxbridge train station there are memorabilia from the past where exploration meant everything. From the Grand Trunk Railway to the Canadian Pacific, the evolution of this station shows the birth of a nation.

"We interviewed locals, passengers, historians and councilors and partnered with The Township of Uxbridge and the York-Durham Heritage Railway to produce a work that will be important for future generations," says Magro. "We are pleased to bring this fantastic documentary to the people of Toronto."



PRODUCTION NOTES

The Story of Uxbridge Station was a one year project initiated by Wanted Media.

The Township of Uxbridge and the *York-Durham Heritage Railway* became partners in the project in the early stages of development. Denis Godbout, President of the York-Durham Heritage Railway and Pat Mikuse, Councilor for Uxbridge were key members in providing financial and historical support.

Pre-Production commenced in early 2007. The Uxbridge Museum and the Archives of Ontario were institutions which provided background and photographic data for the project. Alan McGillivray and Derek Boles, both recognized Historians, provided incalculable information that gave accuracy and creditability.

September 2007 was the initial date of production. With a small passionate team, *Wanted Media* documented all necessary footage with a budget that was minuscule compared to most documentary projects.

Edited by *Wanted Media*, weaving together a cohesive story seemed almost impossible. With the help of Alan Hardiman and his proficient audio background, the film was completed on time and was premiered in the summer of 2008 at the Uxbridge Music Hall. The film will make its Toronto debut at the *ReelHeART* film festival in summer of 2009.


TOM PANASIAK
